



#### **SPEAKER**



Robert S. Kinney is a New Testament scholar and Anglican priest. He serves as Honorary Assistant Chaplain at Christ Church in Vienna, Austria as well as the Director of Ministries of the Charles Simeon Trust, a Christian ministry dedicated to training Christian ministers in biblical exposition. A native of Illinois, Robert was awarded a bachelor's degree in Early Christian Literature at the University of Chicago. His BA thesis was on idolatry in Paul's epistle to the church in Rome. In 2008, Robert was awarded an MS in Communications (Journalism) from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, focusing his final project on issues of race, education, and Christianity on the South Side of Chicago. In 2015, Robert finished a PhD in New Testament at the University of Bristol in England. His dissertation explored aspects of Graeco-Roman rhetoric in the Gospel of Matthew and was published by Mohr Siebeck in the WUNT II series as Hellenistic Dimensions of the Gospel of Matthew: Background and Rhetoric.
